



The Northern Region is pleased to continue its association with the cardiology unit at the Queensland Children's Hospital in Brisbane, under the passionate and caring stewardship of Dr Nelson Alphonso.

The unit recently treated Makin from Vanuatu, who returned home in late August full of smiles and in good health.

Preparations are now well advanced for the arrival of Maximus, an 18-month-old boy from Timor-Leste who requires surgery to correct a hole in his heart. Flights have been booked, pre-operative appointments arranged, and surgery scheduled.

Maximus and his mother, Lilina, will stay overnight in Darwin while transiting to Brisbane, where they hope to briefly renew acquaintances made during a previous visit for pre-assessment.

During their stay in Brisbane of approximately one month, accommodation is likely to be at the nearby Ronald McDonald House (RMH). We reach out to Rotarians and the wider community to assist with support during this time.

At a joint meeting of the combined Rockhampton Rotary clubs, a certificate of appreciation was presented to Rockhampton South Rotary in recognition of their support. Representatives from Ronald McDonald House also presented at the meeting, highlighting the strong cooperation

ACT REGION UPDATE

ACT welcomes two patients in the New Year

Canberra Health Services, Women, Youth and Children's Hospital has recently established a paediatric orthopaedic service in Canberra. It is under the specialised expertise of Dr Blaise Wardle, the newly appointed paediatric orthopaedic surgeon.

In February 2026, we will be welcoming two children from the same family for treatment. Anis aged 12, and his 3-year-old sister Melanie, are from Tanna Island, Vanuatu. Both children have bilateral club feet (talipes) and come from a small village in the north of Tanna Island.

ROMAC extends its sincere appreciation to Canberra Hospital for accepting two children at the same time from the same family. This illustrates the beneficial collaboration between ACT Health and ROMAC. We will share this family's journey to recovery with you in the new year.

CENTRAL REGION UPDATE

Ivana is a four-year-old girl from Timor-Leste who was diagnosed with congenital heart disease in 2023 following an echocardiogram in Timor. The echocardiogram revealed a small to moderate patent ductus arteriosus (PDA).

In November, Ivana travelled to Australia with her mother Silvia, transiting through Darwin before arriving in Adelaide on 17 November. She was reviewed by her surgeon on arrival and was initially scheduled for PDA surgery on Wednesday 19 November.

However, on the morning of admission for surgery at the Women's and Children's Hospital (WCH), Ivana was found to have a respiratory virus infection. As a result, her surgery was postponed. The revised plan was for a surgical review on 24 November, with possible surgery two days later but this was delayed too.

Finally, Ivana was admitted to the WCH on 3 December and underwent successful PDA surgery under the care of cardiac surgeon Dr Andrew Kelly. She recovered well and was transferred to the Medical Day Unit for observation later that afternoon, before moving to a bed in the adjoining unit overnight. Following a further ultrasound the next morning, Ivana was discharged to stay at Ronald McDonald House with her mother Silvia during her recovery.

Ivana attended her final consultation with Dr Kelly on 8 December at the WCH. A follow-up ultrasound confirmed a clean bill of health, and she was discharged on no medications.

She returned home on Wednesday 10 December, once again transiting through Darwin and supported by Judith and the Darwin team during their transit journey.

EASTERN REGION UPDATE

Six-month-old Baby Hilario from Timor-Leste was born prematurely. He was later diagnosed with bilateral retinopathy of prematurity, a serious condition affecting both eyes. He required vitreo-retinal surgery to save his sight.

Hilario and his mum, Ninevia, arrived in Sydney on 7 December to undergo pre-surgery testing and receive specialist medical care. Surgery was successfully performed on 12 December at The Children's Hospital at Westmead under the care of ophthalmologic surgeon Dr Amanda Le and her dedicated medical team.

Hilario and Ninevia were initially hosted by ROMAC Eastern Chair Anita Robinson, and then supported by the wider Eastern Region Committee. After several days in hospital, they stayed at Ronald McDonald House Westmead while Hilario continued his recovery and awaited medical clearance.

Eastern Region Committee member Maggie Thorn played an instrumental role in supporting Hilario and Ninevia throughout the post-surgery period. Her dedication and compassion are greatly appreciated.

During their stay, Ninevia also received heartfelt support from Sister Eufemia and Marzieh Brentall, both originally from Timor-Leste and now living in Sydney. Their kindness, cultural connection, and home-cooked food provided comfort and encouragement. They were a great source of strength to both Ninevia and the Eastern Region team.

Following a successful post-surgery review, Hilario and Ninevia were cleared to return home and departed Sydney on 20 December, just in time to celebrate Christmas with family and friends in Timor-Leste.

This beautiful outcome was made possible through teamwork, generosity, and care. Sincere thanks to everyone who played a part in Hilario's journey.

Fifteen-year-old Antonio from Timor-Leste is scheduled to arrive in Sydney in early January to receive specialist treatment and surgery for his right eye.

Antonio sustained a traumatic eye injury after being struck by a ball while playing football with friends. Although he received immediate treatment in Timor-Leste, the intervention was unfortunately unsuccessful. Doctors in Dili contacted ROMAC to seek help to access further specialist care.

Antonio will travel to Australia with his mother, Ana, and will be under the care of ophthalmic surgeon Dr Gaurav Bhardwaj from the Retina and Eye Clinic NSW. Antonio will need to remain in Australia for about two weeks after surgery.

Antonio and Ana will be kindly hosted by several Rotary families. Eastern Region Chair Anita Robinson will initially support Antonio through his surgery, after which they will enjoy the hospitality of other generous Rotary families.

I am sincerely grateful for the wonderful support extended to Antonio and his family, which will make his life changing treatment possible.
